- 2. The real online therefore is lick of self-control. There are several polygamists who give the filtes to adultery. Therefore monogamy is not the clump.
- "Alasoye" brings forward again this illogical statem at that monogamy is the cause of adultery among young ladies who are looking forward for mono-
