

Order Made Under The Dogs Ordinance, Cap. 56.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon the Commission by section 16 of the Dogs Ordinance, Chapter 56 (1948) Laws of Nigeria, the following order is hereby made:

1. This may be cited as the Rabies (Ikeja Division) Declaration and Prohibition (Revocation) Order, 1951, and shall come into operation on the 15th day of January, 1951.

2. The Rabies (Ikeja Division) Declaration and Prohibition Order, 1950, published in Gazette No. 53 of 23 September, 1950, is hereby revoked.

Nigerian Savings Certificates

Holders of these certificates are reminded that, under the terms of the Nigerian Savings Certificates Ordinance, 1941, and relative Regulations, that certificates mature 10 years after date of issue, and that therefore no further interest accrues. The certificates were first issued in January, 1941, and those which accordingly reach maturity and earn the full interest during the current month,

2. Holders may therefore wish to apply for repayment on maturity (i.e. 10 years after the date of their certificates) in which case they should apply to either this office or any Post Office or Bank for a form of application for repayment. The form should then be completed and sent to this office. In the case of those resident in the United Kingdom, the application for repayment should be made to the Crown Agents for the Colonies, 4, Millbank, Westminster, London S.W.1.

3. Repayment will be made in one of the following ways:

- in cash at a Post Office.
- in cash at a Bank.
- by payment to a Post Office Savings Bank account in the holder's name provided that the amount deposited in it does not exceed £500 during any one financial year (1st April to 31st March) and £2,000 in all.

If desired, the amount can instead be paid to a Savings Bank Account in the name of any other person nominated by the holder, subject again to the limits of £500 and £2,000 referred to above. The present rate of interest on Savings Bank deposits is 2½% per annum.

4. Should the holder decide to have the amount paid into a Savings Bank Account, he should say so on the form and state the number of his Savings Bank book if he already has one. If he has no account, the Post Office specified by him in his application for repayment will be authorised to open a Savings Bank account. After receipt of advice from the Treasury that this has been done, the holder should produce his book of certificates to the Post Office named which will remove the matured certificates and issue him with a Savings Bank book. If he already had a Post Office Savings Bank book, he should take that book, as well as the certificates, to the Post Office concerned.

5. The main points to remember are:

- that the full interest of 5½% is earned in respect of every Shs. 15/- certificate in excess of 10 years after the date of issue of the certificate and no further interest accrues after that time.

(b) forms of application can be obtained from any Post Office or Bank or from this office.

(c) The application forms should then be completed and sent to this office which will arrange payment in accordance with the holder's wishes as shown on the form and will advise him of the action taken. Where payment is to be made to a Savings Bank account the holder should state this clearly on the form, together with the name of the Post Office and the number of his Savings Bank book, if he already has an account.

Nigerian Football Gold Coast Earns Millions From Cocoa

PICTORIAL RECORD PRESENTED BY U.A.C.

A unique volume, covering in pictures and print the history of Nigerian football tour of England 1949, has now arrived from London, and has been committed for safe keeping to Mr. A. G. Marshall, Chairman of the Nigerian Football Association.

Book is green, Morocco, the cover bears the crest of the touring team and on the title page is inscribed "A record of the visit to England of the Nigerian Football Team 1949". Then follow 21 pages of thick card, size twelve inches by sixteen. Turning the pages slowly, we can follow the fortunes of the tourists from the day they landed in Liverpool until the day they sailed for Lagos from the same port.

Excellent photographs show incidents in every match played and illustrate every social event and there also descriptions of every match and every event, photographs usually illustrating from press cuttings. Finally, the 1st cutting of all is the leading article from the London "Times" on the day the team left England, paying a warm tribute to the tourists "who leave behind a fine impression of the risk sport of the premier colonial territory of the Empire". The last page of the volume bears the simple inscription "Presented by The United Africa Company Limited".

The history of the volume is also simple. The U.A.C.

was actively interested in the tour in various ways and one practical form of that interest was to arrange photographs for use in Nigeria Football Association, was to provide for the records of the F.A. a representative selection of prints and other professional photographic material of tour. From this original suggestion developed the idea of the present permanent record in book form. It is of some interest that the collecting, preparation and printing of the selected material took almost exactly twelve months.

New British Council Centre

The new British Council Centre at 25, Agip Street, the old Headquarters of the Royal Society of Nigeria, will be open to visitors from Monday next, 22nd January, and the Henry Carr House will become entirely offices. All public meetings will be held in the new Centre from the 22nd January.

Fully facilities are not yet available at Agip Street, and the old Council Centre is not yet open, but the lounge and reading room, and lecture rooms are ready and will offer ample facilities for economy administration than that in Henry Carr house.

The remaining rooms will open during the next month as may be ready and the official opening ceremony will take place later in the year from the new headquarters in Agip Street.

Cocoa farmers of the Gold Coast, the independent new state of GHANA, netted £1,000,000 in 1949, says the annual report for 1949-50 of the Colony, published in London. In all, 318,688 tons of cocoa were harvested, representing an increase of 16% on the previous year and a decrease of 13% in value, yet the value of each ton was £3.125. The decrease in value was due to the fall in the price of the commodity in the world market.
