

Dowries May Pe Crime In India

New Research For World Paper Shortage

Mr. M. F. Ajose Dies

LONDON.—The going is to ensure that the dowry remains a going in India only because a crime punishable by imprisonment if held in dowry by women in the Indian Parliament are passed.

Two separate bills, introduced by Sheela Devi Nohria and Shri Mataji Rani, seek to amend the dowry system of India and prevent the practice both for giving and receiving dowry in the event of exceeding one thousand rupees being heavier. The penalty for taking dowry under the Bill extends from one month to six months simple imprisonment or a fine, or both.

WASHINGTON.—Because of the shortage of wood-pulp paper throughout the world, a laboratory in the United States is doing research to find new ways of commercially manufacturing paper from substitute raw materials. Known as the Herty Foundation Laboratory, this nonprofit research organization located in the southern State of Georgia performs experiments for paper companies in the United States and other countries.

Recent progress at the laboratory include tests on native New Zealand woods, on Mexican pine, and on "Bamboo" reed cane and grass from East Africa. The incense tree of India, or BOSWELLIA SERRATA, has been tested for a paper mill in India. Extensive experiments with bamboo from Ecuador and India and also on tall wood, or SHOREA ROBUSTA, from from India have been made. Additional experiments are planned for this year.

The most successful venture so far has been with bamboo. Fine-grade book, bond, and tissue papers have been manufactured from its fiber. Bamboo requires 10 years to grow to commercial size, but this two-thirds of the crop can be cut each year. At the request of a business group in India, the Herty Laboratory has demonstrated that standard newspaper can be made from 25 percent bamboo and 75 percent tal wood.

A fine-grade paper has been produced from African Bango reed, a cane plant that yields two crops a year. A heavy-crested paper has been made from chicken feathers, and the pulp from feathers also has been blended successfully with other fibers to make an inexpensive commercial paper. The laboratory has done basic research in producing paper products from cotton plant stems and also from a sugar cane residue called bagasse. A heavy paper has been made from cotton stems and several paper products, including newspaper, have been produced from bagasse.
