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## INSTALLATION OF NEW BABASALE

### OF THE CHRISTIANS.

#### A UNIQUE CEREMONY.

Friday the 5th instant was a red letter day among Ibadan Christian elements. At 8 a.m. on that day, Elder Babalola D. Adedoyi was installed the Babasale of Ibadan Christians by the Oba, before, in succession to the late Emmanuel Adesina the last holder of the office.

Early in the morning crowds of people could be seen along the roads, leaving to the Babasale house and by 7.30 the ministers of religion and representatives of the Churches in town had arrived to grace the occasion by their presence. The drummers and orators were already there at dawn.

At 7.50, the baggers announced the approach of the Oba-babalas and his attendants who was received with marks of great respect. The usual ebbo and celebrations being over, the Babasale about was summoned to appear before the Oba-babalas, at whose commands, the new Chief Oba-wo Adeniran Labosinde gracefully performed the ceremony with the following words—

"Eekiki Adabiyi, the Oba-babalas install you the Babasale of Ibadan Christians to-day. The Oba-babalas do not confer on you a sedition but a powerful Chieftaincy. Long may you live to enjoy the office."

This Formula was thrice repeated before "IYIYE" leaves were placed on the Babasale's head. This was followed by loud acclamations of "Musa" by the great crowds of people.

After paying his obeisance to the Oba-babalas, the newly installed Babasale was lifted clear from the ground and placed on horseback by the people. Great crowds accompanied him home, preceded by the Ibadan N.A. Police Band. Drudon, Sekere, a pueras, drummers and dancers with pressing horns and motor cars.

The new Babasale went straight to St. James' Church + Oko Bala was a short Service of thanks was conducted

The Rev. Nathan J. Okunade after an instructive address presented the Babasale with a large volume of Yoruba Bible in the name of the Churches in Ibadan.

The Rev. D. A. Williams, Canon S.V. Latitudes, Rev. P. V. Adedoyi, E. B. Alalade and F. C. Akigbolajo took part in the service.

The large edifice was simply crowded and sat with Christian, pagans and muslim well-wishers who accompanied the new Babasale home, whose feasting and dancing was continued till night fall.

Wishing the new Babasale of the Christians a long life of usefulness in his new post.

WITH profound gratitude and respect for your well known aims and the high position it has pleased the ALPHABETIC to obtain for your ALPHABETIC in the government of our COUNTRY.

It is our desire to submit certain matters of national moment before your ALPHABETIC for consideration at your next Conference taking place at Ibadan in March next year, the most pivotal of which is:

OUR MEAT SUPPLY

YOUR attention must have noticed from the Departmental Annual Report of the Customs and the Nigerian Railway, the large number of Cattle regularly coming down from the North for distribution throughout the Southern Provinces and exportation to the Gold Coast and other West African Colonies. The value of this trade is running into hundreds of thousands of Pounds annually, going direct into the pockets of our Hausa and Fulani neighbours in the north.

It is the belief that we in the southern Provinces—particularly the Yoruba States—should make an effort to secure a portion of this growing trade by embarking upon Cattle rearing industry.

The CATTLE in the south have been losing a great deal of money every year by not making a good use of the great opportunity afforded them in the large, tracts of open grass-lands distributed all over the Yoruba States—particularly in Abokuta, Ilorin, Oyo, Lagos, Ondo, Ibadan, Kogi, and the Benue. This is because of the fact that the cattle should be reared on a large scale for export and hence consumption.

These luxurious fidders are almost destroyed by fire every year instead of being utilized for cattle rearing. This practice was the cause of the destruction of many rich forests, large areas of fertile lands and continual encroachment of barren lands in the south.

By introducing cattle rearing industry on a large scale, the farmers in the Yoruba States will greatly contribute their quota to the prosperity of Nigeria. There is no reason why another 20,000 or more heads of cattle should not be raised annually for the export and home markets alone. It is certain that the Agricultural Department and the Veterinary Officer will only be too pleased to render all necessary assistance in furthering the industry. The Revenue will be benefited through The Customs and local taxes.

We trust our Ojasa will give this matter their deep consideration and take the necessary steps to induce farmers within their administrative jurisdictions to take on cattle raising in right earnest.
