In the Nigeria Guzette of 24th October is published an ordinance which is to come before the next session of the legislative tically to be invested with the powers of making and unmaking thefs Clause 2 of the proposed Ballrans thus; 'Upon the death resignation or depisition of any chief in the suc essor of such chief or head chief as behalf in accordance with Native law and custom (as to which the Governor shall be the sole judge) and if no such selection is made or if the selection made is not approved by the Governor, the Governor may himself select and appoint such person as he may deem fit and proper as the successor of such chief or head chief as the ase may be. This Bill is bound to meet with the strong stopp action as it represents one more effort on the part of bu-aucracy to make an incoad into the social organisation of the country, While we quite apprecitte the aim of Government to ensure that such important offices as that of Nativo chiefs are occup, d by only these best fitted for the task, we are not so sure that the sofest road to accieve such un aim should be through the virtual demolition of existing traditional structures, in a way, the Government wil be stultifying itself if at the same time that its efforts are being employed to reconstruct native society and to create stive Administrations based on the traditions of the people, it should set up a policy which cuts right across this very purpose,
