The visit of His Royal Highness, Prince of
Wales to Ibadan on the 20th April, 1925 was a
remarkable occasion in the history of Yoruba
race.

Many of the Obas from different parts in
Yoruba Provinces assembled together to welcome
him.

The Oni of Ife left for Ibadan at one o'clock
a.m. with the District Officer, Ife Division, B. M.
Carkeek, Esq. accompanied by Lowa Ijarua, one
of the prominent Chiefs in his town and other
retinue together with some of the omo-obas such
as E. A. Adeyemi, A. Adereyi, Madam Jabi Owadepo
(Oni's sister) omo-oba Marian Adelaja,
Messrs J. R. Oye (Chief Lowa's son) E. T. Coker,
and the Deputy Registrar, Mr. J. F. S. Paulissen.

Among the Obas who were present, were the
Alake of Abeokuta and Alafin of Oyo who were
introduced to His Royal Highness together with the
Oni of Ife and Qwa of Illesha.

The introduction of the four Obas was followed
by their shaking hands with His Royal Highness
who afterwards gave a very touching address.
The decoration of His Honour the Acting
Lieutenant Governor with C.M.G. brought the
event to a close.

Before the departure of the Alake of Abeokuta,
he rose from his seat, in his gorgeous attire, went
and bowed to the Oni of Ife according to their
tradition and then discoursed with him.

The Qwa of Illesha also did the same as well as
other Obas from Ondo Province who were
introduced to the Oni by the District Officer, Ife
Division, who was once in their Province. It was
a great show.

Before they returned to their districts, the three
Obas from Oyo Province, i.e. he Alafin of Oyo,
the Oni of Ife, and the Qwa of Illesha resorted to
Government Lodge at Agodi, where they were
brought together in person, to converse freely by
the Honourable, the Senior Resident, Oyo Province.

The Oni did not allow this opportunity to slip
away without making good use of it by claiming
publicly the Alafin of Oyo and the Qwa of Illesha
as his beloved sons and all of them cheerfully
admitted it in the presence of the Honourable,
the Senior Resident.

The success of the day was due to the good
arrangements effected by the Honourable, the
Senior Resident, Oyo Province, Capt. W. A.
Ross, C.M.G. who with the assistance of some District
Officers, especially Messrs. Carkeek and Lapage,
etc., has brought the show to a success.

They all deserve great thanks in this respect.

OBSERVATION ON THE ADDRESS FROM THE COMMUNITY OF LAGOS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, K.G.

[By ATARI-AJANAKU.]

To the Editor "EKO AKETE."
SIR,

Any reader at home or abroad coming across such headlines as above in our local journals will naturally conclude that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was presented with an address by the community of Lagos, more especially so, as the address itself begins thus :— "We, on behalf of all the inhabitants of Lagos, irrespective of Colour, Race or Creed" etc, etc.

There is no gainsaying the fact that an address was presented, but it was apparently prepared under government auspices, and signed by very few people who represented nobodies but themselves, and most of whom we venture to say signed under a misapprehension, and might have hesitated, if not desisted, from appending their names to such a document for, as we shall disclose later on, the presumption and impudence of the leading parties or those whose instigation was responsible for such an address, is the most surprising of all attempts to hoodwink the community of Lagos.

As a side issue, we recall the representations and activities made by the Lagos branch of West African Congress years ago; when these pharaisaical d'eluded friends of the Government who were not averse to touting operations for signatures to the ill compiled address presented to His Royal Highness, were very loud in their protest against the representation made by that body and thereby condemn all the good works contained in its programme.

Again, it is an additional recollection that Sir Hugh Clifford, the man with the claim to high standard of education and the Administrator of Nigeria—it was, who, in an unguarded moment declared that 17,000 signatories to the Monstes Petition presented to him for the reinstatement of the Eleko represent a poor show of unanimity in a community of 99,000 people inhabiting Lagos and although the majority of the signatories (the 46) are supposed to be literate, it is yet to be verified whether we can believe this in the strict sense of the term. However, as we have remarked, there is ample room to doubt that, if the greatest majority of the signatories had the matter in their hand, they would have been party to such a document.

The loyalty of the people of Lagos, and for the matter of that, of any sane respectable man is to demonstrate, both in writings and otherwise, by

words and deeds the loyalty of every member of the community, but we demur to say that the address presented to His Royal Highness had neither the general approval of the public, nor represented what all of us would have liked presented to our most beloved Prince. Surely, if according to Sir Hugh, 17,000 could not represent 99,000, how can 46 do so? Whether by mathematical deduction, arithmetical exactitudes or logical inferences, we cannot see how any proportion on this score can be regarded as fair. But to proceed.

We have read the address with the greatest regret and wonder that any sane man could have written in a style which exposes both the ignorance and selfishness as the document bears on its face. It will be difficult to dislodge us from the fact that the Europeans administering the government of Nigeria only manage to interpret the sentiments and understanding of the Natives by the representations made to them by certain people (whoever they are,) and, unfortunately, since such representations only reflect the puritanical affections of those members of the community who are so intimal to the interests of this country, there is no reason to wonder at the cause of disagreement which is created in this connection. The people were anxious—very anxious—to show their loyalty in a large measure to their Royal Guest, but by such bad policy thataperced them with such a funny address, the people have got their own sense of duty and loyalty trampled upon.

The signatories can be summed up to consist of political faction of Dr. Randle and his satellites, the white capped chiefs, one or two independents, and about a dozen misguided wiseacres. The authors or compilers of the address had never at any time consulted the people or obtained their mandate, and they certainly were too few and too proud to get the community to grant them any power of representation to the extent of saying "We, on behalf of all inhabitants of Lagos, &c."

We are not suggesting that the address cannot be fully representative until and unless, it is signed by the whole inhabitants of Lagos; but our contention is that before any public address of such description can be prepared or presented, the previous mandate or consent of the people by means of a public meeting is a *sine qua non*, but neither of these was obtained or even solicited in this case, and other formalities to be observed before the presentation, &c., should have become an accomplished fact were deliberately ignored. An omission which depreciates the intrinsic value of the address, and it is a thousand pities that the *Dramatic* and other principal actors in the *Drama* had allowed such an address which

they knew or ought to have known cannot escape severe criticism to be presented to no less a distinguished and Royal personality than our much beloved Prince of Wales.

It is indeed a matter for regret as it is a most unpleasant duty to criticise the address, but a great principle of representation has been violated; the wishes and constitutional rights of the people have been treated with contumely, and therefore the wild and extravagant pretensions of those responsible for the preparation of the address must be repudiated without fear or favour. The People's address intended for the Prince of Wales approved at a public Mass Meeting submitted to Government was sent into oblivion. The reason then why the forty-six-signed-address was adopted can better be imagined than explained, especially as we observe that certain obscurantists who dissociated themselves from the peoples address now identify themselves with the new semi-government address.

We regret that want of space prevents the continuation of this Article which is deferred for our next issue.
