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OUR REPRESENTATIVE.

The Honourable E. H. OKE.

THE OYO Province is rather fortunate in the appointment of its Representative to the Legislative Council of Nigeria. The choice of Elder E. H. Oke is one of the best that has yet been made to that august assembly. It will be received with universal approbation among every class of the intelligent community in the Province, and the whole of Nigeria. Given an equal opportunity of the Franchise like at Lagos and Calabar, the result of polling in this Province would not have proved otherwise—where age, experience, and knowledge of the country's needs are concerned.

Elder E. H. OKE is one of those Yoruba patriots who have served the interests of their country faithfully in many ways both by precepts and examples. Born in the town of Ijaiye when Kuruami the Great Yoruba Generalissimo was in his glory. He was introduced to the Missionaries by his uncle Mr. S. Robert—a Repatriate from Sierra Leone—in the year 1860 after his father's death during Ijaiye Wars.

He received his early training from the German Missionary Rev. A. Mann and he subsequently entered into the Missionary Training Institution in 1868; together

with Bishop Oluwole and others, received their appointments as Tutors in the same School in 1872 where he remained for 14 years a Tutor.

He resigned the C.M.S. work and joined the service of the Government of Lagos in 1886, where, he held various appointments as Clerk, Store Keeper, Harbour Department, Chief Steward on board H. M. S. *Gertrude* from which position he was latterly transferred to the Prison Department as Chief Warder. He had acted on many occasions as Keeper of Prisons and for the faithful discharge of which duties he received pecuniary rewards from the Government. In recognition of his sterling qualities and worth, he was finally sent by the Government to England to study Prison Laws and Discipline in 1892. He studied in Islington and Kessington Prisons Pentonville and Wormwood-Scrubs. He resigned in 1907 after a record of excellent service to the government, covering 20 years.

He was invited to Ibadan to take up the newly established Balé's School, Oranyan, from here he was offered the post of Secretary to the Ibadan Native Government which office he held from 1912 to 1916 when he resigned.

The part he took in the organisation of the U.N.A. Church is well-known—he is one of the few surviving originators of that body to-day. The Jehovah-Nissi Church at Idi-Ikan and the U. N. A. Church at Ijaiye are practical testimonies of his zeal for the advancement of Christianity in his country. In his capacity as an Elder of his church, he has laboured much for the benefit of Ibadan, by giving them sound advices and useful Lectures from time to time.

We congratulate the Senior Resident of the Province and our Baba L'Afin for the wise selection of our Representative to the Legislative Council of Nigeria.

Rather sad indeed for yesterday's occurrence in the shocking news that awoke us in the morning of the premature death of the Rev. Michael Nun Quashie Sagoe, an able young and powerful preacher of the Wesleyan Church. His loss was greatly felt among his comrades and the general community—Oh! very jovial, always smiling and chatty.

He was only just transferred from Jéba District to Lagos District, Eresko Church, and one could judge how he was forced by the community of Lagos, by the great crowd of mourners following his remains to Ikoji Cemetery for interment. He was of Masonic, Temp'a's, and Shephard's Fraternities. The members of the latter formed in procession with the Choristers together with the following Ministers e.g.—Rev. H. W. Stacey (European) Principal of the Wesleyan Boys' High School, Rev. A. N. Cole, Superintendent of Tinubu Circuit, Rev. Evan E. Williams, Superintendent of Olowochoho Circuit, Rev. S. A. Pearse of Ojuba Church and Rev. D. A. Balabunmi of Williams' Memorial Ebute-metsa Church; Wesleyan Boys' Scout and fall representatives of Women's Associations also Fan'ee Church representatives were also part of the procession.

The Hearse which was used for the first time being belonging to Eresko Church—"Egbe Ife" and which was clearly engraved upon the Glass of the Hearse; the procession was grand. They sang all the way to the Cemetery. After the conclusion of the service at the grave, the Women's Association sang "Sleep on Beloved" in a thrilling voice and the song was so pathetic and touching that a good many people were shedding tears.

He died like a faithful Christian. His last words to a friend who visited him on his bed just before his passing away were "Rest in Peace."
