THE INTER-COLLEGIATE SPORTS, 1924.

As usual the Champion Shield was competed for this year by three Colleges—namely: St. Andrew's Oyo, Baptist Ogbomoso and Wesley's Isey Ibadan, at the Race Course, Ibadan, yesterday from 8.30-11 a.m. and 4.30-7 p.m.

In the morning the first event was "Putting the Weight." It was very striking to observe that when these strong and expert students held the Weight it was just as if it were as light as an inflated football. Ogbomoso won the first and second prizes and Wesley College the third.

The second was the 100 Yds Race which gave the first place to the Wesley College, second place to, St. Andrews and the third to the Baptist Ogbomoso. The third was the Throwing of the Cricket Ball in which the Baptist students gave no place to rivals—The first the second and third places fell to their lot. The next event was the Preliminary Quarter-mile Race which did not yield any result till the afternoon. Next came the Long Jump in which the Oyo students won the first and second places and Baptist Ogbomoso the third.

Then the Tug-of-war which was won by the Baptist team over St. Andrew's. The rest of the Sports was now left for the afternoon.

As expected, the morning scenes did not include many people, for everyone or let us say every business man must be about in his respective office. But in the afternoon, the whole field was full of spectators.

The afternoon was opened up by competition in Pole Jump. St. Andrew's won the first and second places and Ogbomoso Baptist won the third; as the Pole Jump was going along another open event was taking place elsewhere in the field, that is "Bun Race" this caused a great laughter all about the field, it was impossible to control the uproar of the people when they saw the competitors trying to eat the suspended lumps of bread while their hands are tied to their backs. Next comes the final Quarter-mile Race in which St. Andrew's College won the three places. The High Jump came next at which Oyo College excelled.

Then came about the One-mile Race—a tedious journey and the three places of merit curiously divided themselves up among the three competing Colleges. This done, another Tug-of-war took place between the St. Andrews and Wesley College. Oyo students won this over Wesley College. This brought about the decision that the Baptist Ogbomoso came first, then St. Andrew's Oyo came second and Wesley College came third. When all the points were added up, it was found that the Baptist College Ogbomoso has won the Competing Shield.

The Band of the 4th Battalion, Nigeria Regiment discussed lively music throughout the whole afternoon.

It was growing dark when the Sports were completed that there was no time for the usual speeches and the prizes were distributed by Mrs. Pomeroy. Three cheers each were then given the lady and the Winners.

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THE RIGHT THING.

II.

A S PROJECTED by its founder, Sir Gordon Guggisberg, K.C.M.G., Governor of the Gold Coast, the new College at Achimota contains the seed of a future great institution of learning in West Africa. This college not only provides for giving instructions in the learned professions, it has actually started a Law School in its departments and together with a medical school under contemplation, will confer a great blessing upon West Africans. It will then be easy for students to pass all the exams in West Africa and only travel to Europe for 3 or 6 months for their final—instead of the long and expensive stay of 3–8 years required to complete their studies and qualify in the professions. This is "The Right Thing" for West Africa.

We have in Nigeria 7 Colleges and the 8th is being arranged for. It is sad to observe that there is not a single school for the teaching of law and medicine in the whole country. It is true that the King's College, Lagos has some provision for teaching these subjects, but there is no separate department or school provided for the purpose of instructing the aspiring students in Nigeria in these branches of knowledge.

It is hoped the Authorities will look into this matter of providing a Law and Medical School in Nigeria, in view of

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the congested state of the British Universities. This also will save for the people thousands of Pounds annually spent on students who are obliged to proceed to Europe for their professional studies.

We want knowledge it is true, but we must remain and our rulers and leaders should help us to remain true Africans, by putting a stop to this unnecessary exodus of the promising youths of the country to Europe in pursuits of learning and after their sojourn only to return home permanently Europeanized.

Public Notice.

The attention of the public is drawn to the provisions of section 240 of the Criminal Code, Chapter 21 of the Laws of Nigeria, which reads as follows:—

"240 (1) Any person who opens, keeps, or uses, any place for carrying on a lottery of any kind whatever, is guilty of a misdemeanour, and is liable to imprisonment for two years.

"241 Any person who prints or publishes, or causes to be printed or published, any advertisement or other notice of or relating to any lottery, or of or relating to the sale of any ticket or chance or of any share in any ticket or chance in any lottery, is guilty of an offence and is liable to a fine of fifty pounds.

"3. In this section the term "lottery" includes any scheme or device for the sale, gift, disposal, or distribution, of any property depending upon or to be determined by lot or chance, whether by the throwing or casting of dice, or the drawing of tickets, cards, lots, numbers or figures, or by means of a wheel or trained animal, or otherwise howsoever."

The term "person" in the above quoted section includes any company or association or body of persons corporate or unincorporate. The using of any place, therefore, whether it be a public place, a club

or a private house, for any purpose in connection with the carrying on of a lottery, whatever kind of lottery it may be, by any person or company or association or body of persons corporate or unincorporate, is illegal.

With regard to sub-section 2, the Police are advised that the printing of any ticket for a lottery or of any rules or conditions for a lottery is illegal, as tickets, etc., would be included in the meaning of the words "any advertisement or other notice." The publishing of any such advertisement or other notice, not necessarily a printed advertisement or notice, is completed when it is generally known that such advertisement or notice exists, even when the person responsible has taken no special steps to make such advertisement or notice generally known.

The definition of the word "lottery" in sub-section 3, includes sweepstakes on horse races, raffles and lotteries of any kind whatever.

This notice is issued as a warning to the public not to contravene any of the provisions of the above quoted section.

A NEW CHIEF SECRETARY.

A telegram has been received from the Secretary of State notifying that Mr. F. N. Baddeley, Under Secretary, Straits Settlements, has been selected as Chief Secretary to the Government of Nigeria, and will probably arrive in Nigeria by the end of the year.

Why we have an Eclipse.

A Simple Explanation.

The word "Eclipse" is composed of two Greek elements meaning a cutting off or a leaving off.

The Moon is a totally dark body, and depends entirely upon the Sun for its illumination.

The Earth turns round the Sun, and the Moon round the Earth. Rays of light generally travel in straight lines, so that whenever the Earth passes between the Sun and the Moon, that is, when the three are in line, certain of the Sun's rays are intercepted and cut off.

If the whole of the light is cut off, we have a total Eclipse of the Moon; if only a portion of the Sun's rays fail to reach the Moon, there is a partial Eclipse, as appeared on the 14th August last.

Similarly, the Eclipse of the Sun occurs whenever the Moon passes between the Sun and the Earth, that is, when these three heavenly bodies lie in the same plane. Certain of the Sun's rays are cut off from reaching the Earth, and thus our Planet becomes darkened sometimes at day time, to the panic of the ignorant.
