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For what shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world yet? We are indeed very grateful to the members of the Nigerian Pastorate Association for bringing into existence some Churches in the principal Railway stations of Northern Nigeria; thus providing heavenly food for their young ones on line. But we regret to state that only those clerks posted in those stations like Baro, Minna, Kaduna, Zaria, Kano etc where the laymen and priests are available respectively in conducting church rites, do enjoy the Christian services on every Sunday and those staff in the bush stations far away from the vicinity of any church or Christian fellowship, have little or no connection with the Church during their tours of 12 or 24 months, before getting leave of absence.

In order to meet the serious spiritual needs of our boys the on line in the North Provinces and in the Railway stations, we suggest that our home parents, should please institute a system of posting preaching leaflets to all the stations studded with Christian staff monthly or quarterly on reasonable monetary terms.

Northern Nigeria is very tempting to young ones to degenerate both morally and spiritually. We are therefore in need of occasional preaching pamphlets for the purification of our actives.

We most cordially welcome the article under "Life worth living" by "an optimist" of the issues of 9/9/24 and we wish him to continue giving us such revival lessons always.

Our hearts really long for words of God. It is true that we get our bibles always near us, but still, human biblical voices or explanation, writings from good Theologians have more convincing effects on the souls of sinners in all ages.

We believe the Editor's aims will not only be based on feeding us with news but that he will also provide us heavenly food by giving up a column in his invaluable journal for preaching articles and by consulting men like Mr. or Revd. "An optimist" men of high Theological faculties, on this particular point.

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PREVENTION.

Continued from our last.

INSANITARY conditions, we are told, often help on the spreading of the dreaded sickness. This will necessitate the augmenting of the existing sanitary staff in each Province to enable them to perform their work thoroughly in every town and district.

The *Salangas* need constant inspection. Many so-called, are not worth the name; they are so shallow and badly made that they are even worse than the *Attitan*—the ancient dunghill or dumping ground for all refuse of the town; the bad odour emanating from many of these *Salangas* is sufficient to cause an epidemic in the localities where they are situated. Whereas the *Attitans* are always made at some distance from dwelling houses, the *Salangas* are sinks dug within the compounds—the areas of some of which are so limited and circumscribed by over crowding as to make the presence of a *Salanga* within its precincts a positive danger to the health of the inmates. The use of Public Latrines for such crowded areas will prove beneficial to the health of the town in general.

The disposal of town refuse is another point demanding urgent attention. The authorities' instructions to the people re the burning of every house-hold refuse

by fire is not always easy of being carried out in the approved method. The difficulty of firing daily fresh leaves used as wrappers for "Agidi" and "Oiley" (the staple food of the country) can be better imagined than described; for if it takes three days at least for such leaves to become sufficiently dry for firing in the hot season, how much more in the wet weather.

It means the accumulation of filth and the breeding of flies and other disease bearing pests in the compounds. To guard against this condition the authorities had erected some Refuse Kilns in the town several years ago, but the scheme fell through for want of sufficient scavengers and sanitary inspection; the Kilns were neglected and finally cancelled. The result is that the *Attitans* are springing up in many undesirable places and within many a compound inside the town.

We are confident that the revival of the Refuse Kilns and Public Dust-bins in suitable quarters of the town will greatly help the work of the sanitary officers.

A great deal of instructing in the right methods of health preservation is needed by the people all over the provinces. It will be a good thing if a similar instruction period as the 'Health Week' now being arranged for Lagos is extended to all the principal towns and centres in Nigeria. The people will then be made to understand the reasons why they should keep their houses and surroundings in a very clean condition. For "Prevention is better than cure."

RETIREMENT ON PENSION OF MR. MICHAEL MACAULAY.

A very pleasant gathering took place in the garden of the Divisional Agent of Messrs John Holt & Co (L'pool) Ltd., at Olowogbowa, Lagos, on Sunday morning the 7th September 1924 at 11 o'clock, in honour of the retirement on pension of Mr. Michael Macaulay after 29 years faithful service in the Company.

The Chair was taken by Mr. S. Lendrum; other European members present included Messrs the Hon. A. Rhodes, the Hon. V. R. Osborne, L. G. Flowers, D. H. Wedge, R. Smith, S. V. Hunt, H. G. Love, and J. F. Bradshaw.

The guests included Messrs. Abraham John, Sigs Cole and W. Gladstone Macaulay, all representing Mr. Michael Macaulay's family, and a few ladies from some members of the African Staff.

The presentation was a superfine clock of quarter striking and Cathedral chime apparatus, framed in old English Oak.

The Hon. A. Rhodes in proposing the toast of the guest of honour, Mr. Michael Macaulay, said:—

Ladies & Gentlemen ; It gives me very great pleasure to see so many of you assembled here this morning. The occasion which has brought us together is one which I

think is unique in the history of the great firm in whose service we all have the privilege of labouring. It is the retirement on pension of an old and valued servant of the Company, Mr. Michael Macaulay.

I do not think our Directors have previously shown their appreciation of long and faithful service in such a gratifying manner, and it is therefore a fitting opportunity for a celebration of this kind. We are here to show our recognition of Mr. Macaulay's work and our esteem and regard for him personally, by presenting to him a clock suitably inscribed as being a token of esteem from his African and European colleagues.

Mr. W. H. B. Van der Puije, the African Accountant of the Company, on behalf of the African Staff seconded Mr. Rhodes' speech, and in elaborate and befitting terms demonstrated the pride and exceptional joy of the members of the staff for the fidelity and integrity which Mr. Macaulay displayed throughout his long years of service in the Company, also that in appreciation thereof, both the members of the European and African staff have gathered together to show the highest regard in which Mr. Macaulay is held by the staff, and pray that God may long spared his life to enjoy the pension.

Mr. Michael Macaulay in responding to the two Toasts so highly proposed of him, thanked very warmly the Honourables, Messrs A. Rhode and V. R. Osborne, for their liberality, kindness and co-operation since the long years he had the opportunity of associating with them in the Company, also thanked Mr. S. Lendrum for the great assistance he rendered to him since he came out as Supervisor. Mr. Macaulay made mention, on passant, that this occasion is very remarkable as it is the first on the list of the Firms represented in Nigeria that pension is granted to their African employees. He also thanked the African

staff for their generosity in subscribing liberally to the gift of Clock made to him, and for their past co-operation and assistance.

The next toast was that of the Directors which was ably proposed by Mr. Kusaka Taylor. He remarked the action of the Directors in giving pension to their African employee as very exceptional and rare and one remarkable in the annals of the European firms in Nigeria.

He mentioned also the consideration which they always give to the complaints of their staff and in particular mentioned their action of 1920 during the time of the boom, which, up to the present, the African staff are still enjoying in spite of the world-wide changes.

This toast was appropriately replied to by Mr. L. G. Flowers the Company's Agent at Estate-Metta.

Another toast which was proposed was that of the European staff. This was suitably done by Mr. C. A. Kasunmu, the Senior member of the Towns shop clerks. He mentioned the difficulties experienced by African clerks in dealing with different Europeans who were placed over them as supervisors at short periods of time and the suitable means adopted by the different Europeans in order that they may be understood. In the course of his speech, Mr. Kasunmu referred particularly to the two Divisional Agents, Messrs A. Rhodes and V. R. Osborne, the latter taking over from the former who has been designated to take up duties in the Liverpool Head Office of the Company after about 20 years labour in Nigeria. He thanked very sincerely Mr. Rhodes for his past liberality, deep-rooted sympathy, impartiality and his love for all the members of the African staff of the company and prayed that God's blessings may shower upon him in his new sphere of labour, also hoped that he will share his survivor Mr. Osborne with those qualities that prompted the African staff to refer to him as their father and not master.

The toast was briefly but fittingly responded to by Mr. Osborne. He thanked Mr. Kasunmu for the way he has proposed the toast of the European staff and pro-

mised to do what he can to further the interest and co-operation that long existed in the Company.

The last toast proposed was that of the African staff by Mr. S. Leadrum, Lagos Supervisor of the Company, and was responded to in glowing terms by Mr. A Scott,

Thus the toasts were ended. A group photograph of both the African and European staff was taken, and refreshments were luxuriously served. The whole ceremony was brought to a close at about 12.40 p.m. by singing the usual "For we are jolly good fellow."
